



## LENT SOUP & STUDY

We will be using *The Cup of Our Life: A Guide for Spiritual Growth*, by Joyce Rupp, for our Wednesday evening Soup and Study.

From the book's back cover:

*"Anyone thirsting for a more intimate and disciplined life of prayer will find a rich wellspring in *The Cup of Our Life*. In this original and practical book Joyce Rupp shares how the ordinary cups that we use each day can become sacred vessels that connect us with life and draw us ever closer to God. She explores how the cup is a rich symbol of life, with its emptiness and fullness, its brokenness and flaws, and all of its blessings. This creative guide for individual and group prayer offers six weekly themes based on different images of the cup. For each day the author offers a short inviting essay, a wisdom saying, a scripture verse, a brief meditation, questions for journaling, and a suggestion for keeping the theme close to one's heart throughout the day."*

We will meet every Wednesday night at 6:30 pm beginning February 24 through March 24. We will share a simple soup and bread supper, followed by a brief introduction to the evening's theme, followed by discussion and sharing in small groups. Each evening will end with Compline, finishing by 8:00 pm.

I hope you will join us for these evenings in Lent and in this opportunity to grow deeper in faith during Lent.

## ***Parish-Wide Recital***



On three Monday evenings in November we were treated to a feast of organ music. ## ADULT FORUMS

### **January 10: *Take and Eat Part II***

Eucharist Theology and Practice in the Anglican Tradition. The Rev. Nick Morris-Kliment recaps Eucharistic theology and practice up to the Reformation, then describes developments in Anglicanism from the 16<sup>th</sup> century to the present.

### **January 17: *Aquinas and Anglicanism***

The Rev. Matt Kruger will talk about the influence of Thomas Aquinas, Thomism and Scholasticism on the early reformers of the Anglican Church. Matt is a doctoral student in theology; recently ordained to the priesthood out of his home parish of St. Paul's in Bedford. He serves as Trinity's curate.

### **January 24: *Help for the Hurting***

A team from *The Samaritans* will present their comprehensive approach to the tragic and difficult to discuss topic of suicide. More than 1 million lives are lost to suicide worldwide each year – more than deaths from murder, armed conflict or HIV. In Massachusetts, more than 65,000 family members are affected by suicide each year; more than 11,000 attempts require medical attention, over 500 attempts are completed.

### **January 31: *The Infancy Narratives of Luke***

Professor Pheme Perkins, Boston College is one of the pre-eminent New Testament scholars of our day, Prof. Perkins has taught in the Dept. of Theology at Boston College since 1972. She has written nearly 20 books and countless articles; contributed to many standard commentaries, including the New Interpreter's Bible and the Catholic Study Bible; and is associate editor of the 3rd edition of the New Oxford Study Bible. Her work has been translated into Italian, Japanese, and Spanish. She is an active Catholic layperson. Professor Perkins will also be our preacher at 10 am.

### ***February 7: From Catholic to Episcopal: The Journey***

The Rev Dr. Christian Brocato began life as a Roman Catholic, became an Episcopalian in young adulthood, returned to Roman Catholicism and became a Dominican friar and priest, then came back to the Episcopal Church. Along the way he earned a PhD in musicology. Intrigued? Come hear his story. Christian is currently priest in charge at All Saints, Stoneham; a priest associate at Church of the Epiphany, Winchester; and a full time college administrator.

### ***February 14: Trinity Outreach***

Cooperative Metropolitan Ministries (CMM), Alex Kern, Executive Director. CMM is Boston's oldest interfaith social justice network, formed in 1966 to address poverty, housing and racial justice to bring about Dr. Martin Luther King's vision of the Beloved Community. Alex will share CMM's activities, featuring The Day of Interfaith Volunteer Service, which will engage youth of many faiths on April 18. Alex hopes to bring several youth and their families. A Quaker, Alex is also Protestant Chaplain at Brandeis, and has had a broad and multifaceted peace and social justice ministry in the US and around the world.

### ***February 21: Annual Meeting and One Service at 9 AM***

There will be **one worship service at 9:00 am** followed immediately by the Annual Meeting. No Forum this Sunday.

### ***February 28: Why Theological Education Matters***


The Rev. Dr. Katherine Ragsdale, President and Dean of The Episcopal Divinity School. Katherine was instituted as the sixth Dean of EDS in October 2009. At the time of her appointment she had served as vicar of St. David's in Pepperell for nearly 15 years, and was president and executive director of Political Research Associates, a progressive think tank. She was profiled in the March 5, 2009 issue of the Boston Globe. In her new post she has been thinking deeply about the significance of theological education to the church and the wider world.

# JANUARY ARTS GALLERY

## **JAKE DANN: *Ice***

A photographic essay, which focuses on the many colors and forms of local ice. Ice plays a key role in Earth's climate story and ranges in size from snowflakes to continental ice sheets—extremes that require expensive equipment and travel. So, Jake Dann photographs ice at hand on puddles, ponds, and creeks. On this scale, we can see how ice grows in feathery crystals, traps gas bubbles, records cycles of freezing and thawing, cracks along curving fractures, and creates unique environments for life. Jake aims to bridge artistic enjoyment of form and pattern with scientific understanding of Earth systems.



When the days are cold and clear, pond ice grows thick and black—a smooth pavement and clear window to the pond's depths. Under stress, the ice breaks with loud rolling snaps. Kneeling down to examine the long cracks reflecting sunlight, one can see that the ice is at least 3" thick. The cracks are not simple planar breaks, but complex systems of small curving fractures (left) creating dazzling colors.

With tiny bubbles as the starry background, the luminous cracks mimic nebula—supernova remnants and the birthplace of stars as seen with the Hubble Space Telescope (below right). This uncanny similarity at such diverse scales and settings highlights the universe's self-similarity, as if every part contains the whole, bringing the heavens down to the pond.

### **SING HANSON: *Cleaning Out the Studio***

I have worked in museums since I left college, home-based at Boston Children's Museum where I served as graphic and exhibit designer, then (moving to the dark side) as an administrator for the exhibition program. In 2003 I left the museum world to pursue a long-awaited career in fine art. You will see on display the fruits and habits of that career swap. (Note that I am still an inveterate collector of disparate stuff, have a graphic sensibility that cannot be quelled, and think visitors read labels.) 


