Planning Our New Parish House: What Are the Next Steps?

Activity continues on plans for the new Parish House facility. Our architects are constructing models and drawings that will be available for viewing over the next several weeks. We will be soliciting your comments and feedback as the evolution continues toward a completed design.

By September, we will have schematic diagrams defining the interior and exterior. These will give a detailed vision of our new facility and construction costs. In the autumn, assisted by a professional fundraising firm, we will survey the congregation to determine if there is sufficient financial support to proceed. The decision to begin a formal capital campaign will be made by the end of 2010.

Fundraising would begin in early 2011. Once the Vestry is comfortable that the targeted amount can be reached, we can prepare construction drawings and obtain permits. Then the project will be put out for bid, a general contractor will be selected, contracts negotiated – and then the real work begins!

The first phase will renovate River Street to provide temporary church offices. Then the existing parish house will be removed, new foundations poured, and walls raised. After 18-24 months of mud and inconvenience, we will dedicate a beautiful new facility to be shared and used by all to help us further God's mission in the community and the world.

FROM THE RECTOR

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Over the past couple of years we have been blessed with many new individuals and families who have decided to make Trinity their church home. We see this growth especially in our Church School, Nursery and in the vitality that new people bring to our parish life. It has been thrilling to see how this has been an ongoing work of the Spirit of God transforming us as a congregation in a very positive way. I also have been very encouraged by the way long-time members of Trinity have responded with generosity and heartfelt welcome to these new members.

One of the realities we are beginning to face is the limitation of our existing space. By now you should have received a letter from the Wardens and me explaining the decision of the Vestry to take the next steps toward the construction of a new Parish House facility. It is greatly needed. Our existing Parish Hall is too small for some Sunday morning Coffee Hours, and grossly inadequate to provide appropriate hospitality after large funerals. We lack meeting space - I met with a group in the Chapel a couple of Sundays ago because all meeting space was in use. Our current Parish House where the Parish Hall and offices are located is very energy inefficient and the offices are poorly laid out. The two bathrooms of the main hallway are insufficient on Sunday mornings, and do not begin to meet the needs of larger gatherings. And because of the way the hallways and entries are laid out, it is very confusing to visitors or newcomers to find their way. Our facilities are holding us back.

I shared these thoughts with a parishioner who replied with her hopes for our parish. What she states is really a vision of what we can be.

"I hope that an undertaking of this sort will bring people together for a common purpose, to build a structure to be shared and used by all to help us further God's mission in the community and the world. I hope the staff will be supported in your work by office facilities that do not hinder their progress, but actually enhance it. I hope we will be in a better position to have outside groups come in to use the facilities. I hope people with physical limitations will have an easier time of it – can you imagine making some of the required turns in your wheelchair to navigate our halls, doors, or offices? I hope the little kids get their own restrooms, and that the choir and hall restrooms won't be so crowded. I hope we can be more gracious hosts for both parish events and events to which we invite others. I hope we can have a parlor for families to use before weddings, baptisms, and funerals."

What a wonderful vision of what a new Parish House could mean for us and for those with whom we share our space.

Very soon we will be able to see models of the present and possible future facilities. I hope you will enter into this phase of our planning with enthusiasm and a willingness to share your ideas. I pray that we all might get a sense of the hoped-for goodness that will come from this.

We are embarking on a very exciting time in the life of Trinity Church. God has greatly blessed us. May we be faithful as we respond to the challenges God has placed before us.

Stewardship Minutes

A new series of announcements now happen during the 10 am service. Each week a different member of the parish briefly describes an activity he or she is involved in, what makes that activity meaningful, and how the money you contribute to Trinity supports that activity. These announcements will give you a sense of the many ministries people participate in here and how your pledge dollars support them.

Summer Worship Schedule: 8 & 10 a.m.

You have all been very patient as we have experimented with an alternative summer worship schedule, going to one service for two months each the past two summers. I greatly appreciate your willingness to experiment with this schedule to see if it might work for us.

After a time of prayer and consultation with a number of people I have decided that a single service in the summer is not best for our parish. We conducted a survey to determine peoples' thoughts about the single-service schedule. The results were nearly evenly divided, for and against. But in speaking with people on both sides of this question I have found that those who are opposed to a single service have much deeper feelings about that than those who prefer the single service.

Therefore, we will not be changing the worship schedule for this or future summers. This reminds me of the old adage, "if it ain't broke, don't fix it!"

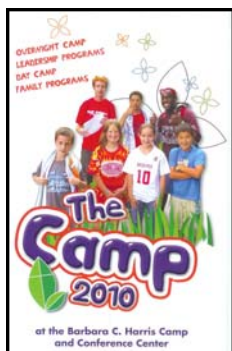

During this session everyone will create a Bible bookmark from beautifully printed papers for your own use or to give as a gift. ***May 9: Life Together: The Diocese of Massachusetts
Young Adult Intern Program***

Jason Long is the associate director of Life Together, a vibrant young adult program in the Diocese. Raised in an evangelical Protestant tradition in Denver, Jason came to Boston College and connected with the Episcopal Church. He did a field placement at The Crossing, the emerging congregation at the Cathedral. After spending a year as Relational Evangelist (he'll explain what that is) he became the Associate Director of the Life Together. He is passionate about the role the Episcopal Church can play both in reclaiming honest evangelism as a part of its heritage, and in reimagining what Church can be. Jason spoke movingly at the 2009 Diocesan Convention of his own faith journey.

May 16: The Latest Economic Outlook
Professor Cathy Mann, Brandeis University

Are we poised for a robust and broad-based global recovery, as suggested by Jamie Dimon, CEO of JPMorgan Chase? Or, is the economy likely to follow modest growth, as suggested by Fed Chairman Ben Bernanke? Or could the situation turn worse, as suggested by the NFIB small-business survey? The gap in economic performance and outlook between Wall St and Main St has never been worse. Will Wall St. pull up Main St or just suck the last breath out? Cathy is a regular commentator on NPR and other news outlets on economic affairs.

May 23: The work of Common Art

Mary Jane Eaton, M.Div, Program Director. During the month of May, the Trinity Arts Council has been exhibiting the work of common art, a program of Ecclesia Ministries. Since 1999, common art has provided space, materials and caring support staff to homeless and low-income members to develop their artistic abilities. Ecclesia Ministries, which embraces common cathedral, common cinema, and a host of other programs and ministries with the homeless, has been providing spiritual community to homeless people since 1994. Choral Evensong Sunday, June 6, 2010 at 5:00 pm

While our Sunday morning Liturgy is the Holy Eucharist, where the focus is on the community gathering as one around our Lord's Table, Traditional Choral Evensong is more a time of prayer and thanksgiving with a meditative feeling. There are lessons read in this service, but the focus is on giving thanks to God for our many blessings and just making that connection with our Creator in a spiritual, prayerful way. For those to whom music speaks in a special, powerful language of its own, the sung prayers of Choral Evensong draw us to the Almighty in a unique way. Many composers have written musical settings of various parts of this Liturgy over the years.

Our Youth Choir will sing music by Edward Bairstow, Harry Brama, and Ronald Arnatt in this ancient Rite. Come hear them sing this service of sung prayer in the Chapel as an end to their program year – let their singing draw you closer to God.



CARING CONNECTION

“My religion is kindness” (The Dalai Lama)

The development of a practice of “loving kindness” is an ancient form of a Buddhist tradition. The custom usually begins with the person cultivating loving kindness towards him or herself, then their loved ones, strangers, enemies, and finally towards all of life.

Radiating loving-kindness is thought to contribute to a world of love, peace and joy. I think this might start in small ways. Some examples we might consider:

If I smile... at someone at coffee hour, that is kindness. But if I stop and ask them how they’re doing, and listen to their reply, that is loving kindness.

If I pray... for our youth who’ll be going on the pilgrimage to Ireland, that is kindness. But if I support them financially, that’s loving kindness.

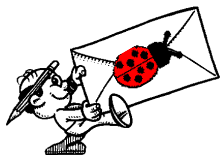
If I send... a note to someone letting them know I’m thinking of them, that is kindness. But if I call them or go to visit them, that’s loving kindness.

If I contribute... food for the hungry, that is kindness. But if I volunteer at the Open Table, or a soup kitchen, that’s loving kindness.

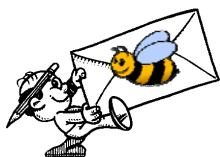


From Stephanie Mitchell

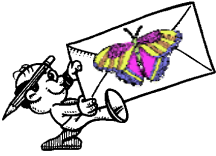

Thank you to all at Trinity for sharing this part of our journey with us.



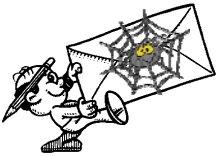
From a pleased parishioner

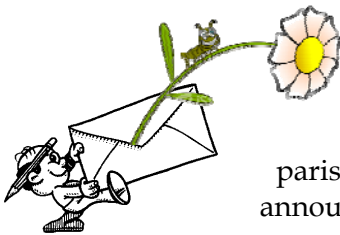

Common Art

Trinity Church will be hosting an exhibit of artwork created at *Common Art* - a program of Ecclesia Ministries and *Common Cathedral*. *Common Art* provides space, materials, pastoral care, and caring support staff to help people who are poor and homeless in Boston develop their artistic abilities. People who live in shelters, rooming houses, on unclaimed couches/benches on Boston's streets, gather every Wednesday at Emmanuel Church on Newbury Street in Boston to draw, paint, sculpt, craft, and share with others in like circumstances.

Common Art works both to promote access to the arts for its members and to help facilitate the expression of members' artistic gifts. In this way, *common art* acknowledges the dignity of all human beings and honors the divine creativity within each person. Through proactive advocacy, *Common Art* provides companionship and inclusive community, a place to come together and to share with other artists.

Over 20 artists have contributed pieces to exhibit in the hopes that others will witness and appreciate the beauty within the homeless community. The exhibit will be on display from April 27 through May 31. For more information about the gallery, contact Anne Lynch or Mary Eaton.

All art from Ecclesia Ministries is for sale and has been priced by the artist. Art may be purchased through Anne Lynch via cash or check made payable to "Ecclesia Ministries" (who will transfer payment to the individual artists). Inviting All Trinity Artists!

Each summer Trinity Church artists have presented one or two pieces of art to be displayed in the Parish Hall for the months of June, July and August.



Once again this summer, the Trinity Arts Council invites ALL ARTISTS from age 5 to 95 to submit one or two paintings, drawings, photographs, pottery, jewelry, fabric art, needle point, embroidery, crewel, knitting, crocheting, quilts, etc. Two dimensional art will be hung on the walls, as will some fabric art. Pottery and jewelry will be displayed in a locked presentation case.

The final display and choice of objects will be determined by the Council. Having two dimensional framed work adds to the preservation of the art and gives a more unified presentation. If the art is worth showing, it is probably worth framing. However, appropriately matted work will also be accepted. Exhibit forms are available in the church office for you to fill out and each piece of submitted art must have an exhibit form attached.

Exhibiting artists are asked to leave the displayed work up through Monday, August 30. If you cannot take your piece(s) down on August 30, a member of the Arts Council will store "left" art in the archives room. The September show will be hung on Tuesday, August 31.

Please submit your art to Anne Lynch in the church office on or before May 31. All art will be held in the locked archives room until June 1, when members of the Arts Council will hang the pieces that have been submitted. The Council will attempt to display at least one piece from each participant. If there is room, a second piece may be exhibited. Every effort is made to protect each piece of art; however, all entries are submitted at the risk of the artist.

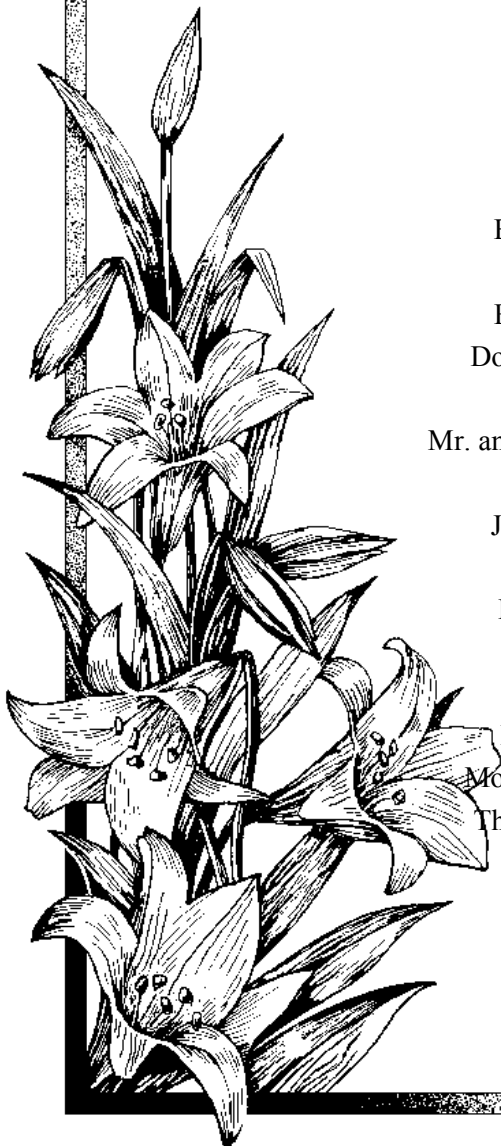

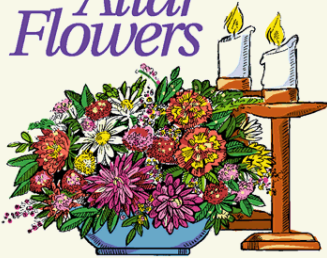

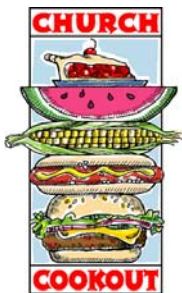
