

## MUSIC NOTES

### ***Prelude Recital & Choral Evensong All Saint's Sunday, November 7 at 5 pm***

Johann Sebastian Bach's Cantata 106 was most likely written for a Funeral in 1708, and is not part of the series intended for regular Sunday Services. In Biblical verses that he set to music, we hear the same theology as in our Burial Office, yet even at the grave we make our song Alleluia, alleluia, alleluia! The opening is a moving Sinfonia played by the ensemble, followed by the title chorus "God's time is the best time" and "In him we live and move and have our being." Soloists and chorus go on to tell of the joy of being with God. The Cantata ends with the choral "In peace and joy I now depart." The work is scored for an older (even in Bach's day) instrumentation of Gambas and Recorders. Our Parish Choir will sing this Cantata as the Prelude Recital celebrating All Saint's Sunday. After the Cantata, the choir will sing the Anglican service of Choral Evensong with musical settings by composers Henry Purcell, Richard Ayleward, William Byrd and others from the 16<sup>th</sup> and 17<sup>th</sup> centuries. Mark your calendars, spread the word and please invite your neighbors!

### ***Advent Choral Evensong Sung by Youth Choir Sunday, December 5 at 5 pm in the Chapel***

Our Youth Choir learns about the traditions of our church and sings Choral Evensong twice each year. This Advent service is beautiful and meditative and one of the most popular. Come for a brief diversion from the rush of holiday commotion and spend 45 minutes hearing the sung prayers of our Youth Choir. There will be musical Settings in the service by Herbert Howells, Ronald Arnatt, and an anthem by Johann Sebastian Bach and responses that I set for them.



# NOVEMBER ADULT FORUMS

**WORD  
WORSHIP

Our Forum program has a new organizing principle. Each speaker will connect with one of **five themes—word, worship, wonder, world, witness**—each being an important aspect of our Christian life. This scheme was proposed by The Rev. Dr. Maureen Kemeza, one of Trinity’s Priests Associate, who is working with Nick in shaping our Adult Forum program.

**Professional Childcare** is available in the nursery beginning at 9am all year long. Emily Hansen is employed full-time at the Infant-Toddler Center in Acton. On Sundays, she leads the care of children to age 4 with the help of parent volunteers.

## ***November 7 (Witness)***

### ***For All the Saints: The Rev. Dr. J. Mary Luti***

On this All Saint's Sunday, Mary will use the beloved hymn as a springboard for presenting reflections on the saints from a Reformation perspective. Mary is a church historian with a special interest in the retrieval of classic figures, movements, and spiritual practices of the Western Christian tradition. She taught for over a dozen years at Andover Newton Theological School in Newton, MA, where she was also Associate Dean for Academic programs. She left Andover Newton to serve as the 16th and first female senior minister of First Church in Cambridge (MA), Congregational, in Harvard Square. In 2008 she returned to Andover Newton where she is currently Visiting Professor of Worship and Preaching and Director of the Wilson Chapel. Dr. Luti has lectured, conducted workshops, and written broadly on the various ways that people of faith have shaped their lives and handed on the meaningful traditions of the Christian church. She is an ordained minister in the United Church of Christ.

## ***November 14 (World): Sandy Creighton The EcoFriendly Home and Church***

The 76<sup>th</sup> General Convention of the ECUSA voted in 2009 to sign the interfaith Genesis Covenant, which pledges to reduce greenhouse gas emissions in all religious facilities by 50% in 10 years from the time of signing. What would this mean for an individual as well as the church? Sandy Creighton, a parishioner from St. Anne's-in-the-Fields, Lincoln who with his wife Elizabeth lives out his passion for sustainable energy, will share with us his experience with his own home. He will also offer us practical information about other sustainable energy programs that can benefit the parish.

## ***November 21 (Word) Proceedings of Diocesan Convention***

Come hear about the presentations, discussions, and actions of the 226<sup>th</sup> Convention of the Diocese of Massachusetts, held at St. Stephen's, Lynn on November 6. Tony Buquor, Nick Morris-Kliment and Matt Kruger, our clergy, as well as delegates Colby Anderson and John Lewis will offer their impressions.

## ***November 28 (Word) The Rev. Nick Morris-Kliment The Gospel of Matthew***

As Advent begins another church year, we begin the Gospel of Matthew, which will be the Gospel we'll hear from most Sundays in the next year. What does Matthew say about the life of Jesus and his significance? How is Matthew different from Mark, Luke, and John? And why are there only 4 Gospels? And what is a Gospel anyway? A biography? A history? A myth? We'll look at the origins of the Gospel as a literary type, and why we have Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John, and not Thomas, Mary, James, and Peter. We'll learn where Matthew is coming from, so that we may hear more clearly his witness to the saving power of Christ for our own lives.

# Thanksgiving SERVICE




Join us at 7pm




